Wendy Fox Liversidge, November 14, 1950 – August 13, 2014. Wendy was the daughter of Bill and Bessie Fox, and she moved to Aruba with them and her sister Bonnie in 1951 when just a few months old. Like others in her class, she left Aruba to finish high school. She graduated from Fryeburg Academy in Fryeburg ME and then attended Marjorie Webster Junior College in Washington DC. In 1970 she married Horace Liversidge. They lived in West Chester PA until 1980, when they moved with their two sons, Preston and Jamie, to Newburyport MA. Until their divorce, Wendy and Horace owned Preston Imports, an equestrian-oriented business located at The Tannery in Newburyport. Wendy is survived by her two sons, two grandchildren whom she cherished dearly, and her sister. Her friend Beth spoke the following at her memorial service: I would like to pay tribute today to my old and sweet friend Wendy who I found wondrous, for she was simple yet elegant, determined and courageous, beyond what she ever realized. She touched my life and I think the lives of many others with her caring friendship, her contagious good humor and her fresh energetic spirit. Through Wendy we formed a sisterhood of caring in this lovely community. If by loving her we become the custodians of her values and her memory we are the most fortunate. She is a cherished friend who has gone on too soon for my liking. I believe she told me in her strong clear voice that it was time for her to go. She led a good yet challenging life here and has finished her course. I wish her well and let her go 'til we shall meet again on our path.

Isla Johnson Normandt Graham died peacefully March 20, 2005 at age 96 following an active and fulfilling life. She was born in Pickens County December 15, 1908 and resided in Greenville and Columbia prior to marrying and moving to the Netherlands Antilles in 1946. She and her husband, Clyde G. Normandt, returned to the States and ultimately Columbia SC in 1971. Prior to 1940, she worked for the SC Adjutant General. Following her marriage to Mr, Normandt, she became a homemaker, mother, and grandmother. She was a lifetime Methodist and worked as church Secretary at Buncombe Street UMC in Greenville and Whaley Street UMC in Columbia. She was an active volunteer and was highly recognized by RSVP and other service groups. She was also lovingly involved in the lives of her six grandchildren and great grandchildren, and was fondly known by all of them as "Nannie." Following the death of Mr. Normandt in 1971, she resided at Christopher Towers in Columbia. She was very active in the Towers community where she met Guilbert Graham. She later moved to Quail Creek to be near her daughter and family, and in 1996 she and Mr. Graham married and resided at the Presbyterian Home of South Carolina. Isla was a member of the Loyal Workers Sunday School Class at Mt. Hebron UMC. She will be remembered for her wit and adventuresome nature, her noted ability to work crossword puzzles, her love of family, and her commitment to her church. Mrs. Graham is predeceased by her parents, Bradley Sevier Johnson and Berma Dodd Johnson; her sisters Irene J. Thruston, Nita Belle Johnson, and Sara J. Bates; her niece Jane Bates; and by Mr. Normandt and Mr. Graham. She is survived by a brother, Bernard S. Johnson; by her son, Gerald S. Normandt (gnormandt@yahoo.com) and wife Grace; daughter Caroline N. Seigler and husband Jim; grandchildren Leigh S.
